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The jubilee 30th edition of the Days of European Film Festival (DEF) took place from April 20 to 25 in Prague, Brno and Ostrava and from April 26 to 30 in other cities throughout the Czech Republic. The genre-diverse show, opened by the Czech premiere of the Italian-French film **L'immensità** with the star Penélope Cruz in the lead role, brought over forty titles, from notable debuts to works by famous directors. "We offered high-quality feature films and documentaries from almost three dozen countries, a cross-section of the work of the famous German director Fatih Akin, titles that have won awards from leading festivals and those that are proud of being nominated for an Oscar, for example, the Belgian film Close, the Irish drama The Quiet Girl or a sensitive film **Aftersun**," says festival dramaturg Šimon Šafránek.

Last year, the DEF show was transformed into a competition festival. The main competition was again focused on debuts, but the festival also offered a competition section for musical films.

A new element of DEF was Fokus focused on the cross-border region of Benelux. "We emphasize Benelux as a centre of co-productions and proof that even small countries can play the first violin in the film industry," explains Šimon Šafránek about the focus of this year's festival, whose program was enriched by, for example, the explosive drama **Rebel** by progressive Belgian filmmakers with Moroccan roots, Adil el Arbi and Bilal Fallah. Zillion, a film based on actual events about creating an eccentric discotheque in the heart of Antwerp, was also shown. Robin Pront's film became a hit in Belgium and will convince Czech viewers that the "nineties" were far from wild only in our country.

All foreign language films were shown with Czech and in most cases with English subtitles. Spectators could also look forward to a rich accompanying program or meetings with filmmakers. The complete program and tickets were available at **eurofilmfest.cz**.

"The universal theme of contemporary European film is youth, whether coming of age, relationships with parents or the search for identity as if the filmmakers see the only hope in the upcoming generation, "says festival dramaturg Šimon Safránek. In the main competition, focused on debuts, several films competed in which unseen children or young actors excel, whether the Portuguese movie Alma Viva or the Latvian drama Sisters. " Ironically, the program of the debut section also includes the fantastic parkour drama **Off the** Rails by the English TV matador Peter Day, which is considered the new *Trainspotting*, "points out Šimon Šafránek.

The music film competition brought various pictures based on actual events and dynamic documentaries. It also featured a new film by Berlinale Golden Bear winner Fatih Akin, **Rhinegold**, dealing with the turbulent fate of the rapper Xatar, or the film **Meet Me in the Bathroom** by Will Lovelace and Dylan Southern, which is an adaptation of the book of the same name about the New York rock scene at the beginning of the millennium. " I'm pleased that the selection includes the sci-fi drama The Gravity by Cédric Ida, in which social gangsters from the Parisian housing estates meet with the atmosphere of von Trier's Melancholia, all with the unique music of the siblings Yevgenija and Saša Galperinová," Šimon Šafránek adds his tip. Einari Paakkanen's documentary Karaoke Paradise took viewers to Finland, where traditional











































evenings with a microphone and well-known hits mean a welcome feeling of human belonging.

Opening of the 30.DEF

On April 20, the festival was opened by the Italian-French film Immensity (L'immensità), set in Rome in the mid-1970s. The world-famous Penélope Cruz plays a woman whose marriage is falling apart, and only her children hold her together. The tension between the parents is closely watched by the eldest daughter Adriana, who feels like a boy and tries to convince everyone around her of this. A lively film about the complexity of growing up was directed by Emanuele Criales.



Most films in the DEF program appeared in the Czech premiere, including those that won points at major world festivals. **The Worst Ones** by directors Lisa Akoka and Romane Gueret shone in Cannes, winning the Un certain regard section. The best director award at the same festival went to Alexandru Belc for the Romanian retro **Metronome**. In the *Orizzonti* section in Venice, Italy, Tizza Covi and Rainer Frimmel won the award for direction for the melancholic portrait of Vera. The Polish film Bread and Salt, directed by Damian Kocur, received the Special Jury Prize in Venice. The Swiss drama **Thunder** by director Carmen Jaquier or the avant-garde **Piaffe** by artist Ann Oren with the excellent Simone Bucio in the role of a movie Foley artist who, thanks to working on an advertisement with a horse, starts to grow a horse's tail have also passed through international festivals. Another premiere was the comedy **Fathers and Mothers** by renowned Danish director and actress Paprika Steen, in which parents and their children go on a weekend school trip.

The festival also showed films with Oscar nominations. The drama The Quiet Girl, directed by Colm Bairéad, takes place in 1981 in the Irish countryside, where a shrill nine-year-old girl, Cáit, grows up with problematic parents. Another Oscar-nominated film is Belgian director Lukas Dhont's subtle story **Close**, which tells the story of two inseparable friends who, after a carefree holiday, find themselves at school and find it difficult to integrate into the broader group of boys. The melancholic drama Aftersun, which tells the story of a divorced young father and his teenage daughter on vacation in a Turkish seaside resort, also received an Oscar nomination. A sensitive film by Scottish director Charlotte Wells closed the festival.

In the selection of current movie hits, the **Stars** section brought meetings with world-famous creators and actors. In the film More Than Ever directed by Emily Atef, the audience was reminded of the art of the tragically deceased French actor Gaspard Ulliel (Paris, je t'aime, Juste la fin du monde). In the film Vera, directed by Tizza Covi and Rainer Frimmel, Vera Gemma plays herself as the daughter of the beautiful Italian actor Giuliano Gemma, who











































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became famous in spaghetti westerns. Another film is the biopic Hilma about the Swedish abstract art pioneer Hilma af Klint, who lived at the turn of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. Director Lasse Hallström (What's Eating Gilbert Grape, The Cider House Rules) cast both his wife Lena Olin and daughter Tora Hallström in his new film.

Among the successful debutants who could take home the main festival prize, in addition to Lisa Akoka and Romane Gueret, we can find the film (The Worst Ones) by Peter Day (Off the Rails), Colm Bairéad (The Quiet Girl), Damian Kocur (Bread and Salt), Anna Oren (Piaffa), Carmen Jaquier (**Thunder**) and Alexandru Belca (**Metronome**) and other up-and-coming artists. DEF also offered Linda Olte Ségra's sensitive film (Sisters), which tells the story of two sisters from a Latvian orphanage who want to be adopted by a family from the United States. Also worthy of attention was the film by Portuguese director Cristèle Alves Meira Alma Viva, which offered a different view of the world through the eyes of children and adults.

Several films reflected on the issue of coming to terms with the collapse of the Soviet Union and current topics such as the fight for freedom and the need to confront misinformation of all kinds. This is what the Estonian film **Kalev** directed by Ove Musting, following the participation of the Estonian basketball team in the prestigious Soviet tournament in 1990, tells about, as well as the drama January by the Latvian director Viesturs Kairišs, which takes place at the beginning of the 90s when Latvia embarks on the path to independence. The stylized science fiction **Phi 1.618** by the Bulgarian director Theodor Ushev offered a look into the future when humanity approaches perfection. On the contrary, Ádám Töséra's film **Blockade** took the audience back to 1990, when Hungarian taxi drivers were preparing to blockade their homeland in protest against rising gasoline prices. The media hunt for a supposed suspect in a brutal murder is the subject of another film, **The Judgement**, by the Dutch director Sander Burger. Ukrainian cinematography also has its place in this section. The film **Butterfly Vision** by Maksym Nakonechny tells the story of a female soldier who returns from several months of war captivity in the Donbas. "There are several topics that are moving Europe and the world at the moment, which are also reflected in cinematography and encourage us to think more deeply and critically. One of them is undoubtedly the Russian-instigated war in Ukraine and the spreading threat of disinformation. This inspired us to select films for the festival section "To the Point", protected by the Representation of the European Commission. The films in our selection directly show the very creation of disinformation and the fight against dictatorships, which are built on the active spread of lies," adds Monika Ladmanová, head of the Representation of the European Commission in the Czech Republic.

In the long term, the festival also gives space to films that deal with issues of nature. This year, the naturalistic film Whale Nation, in which Jean-Albert Lièvre introduces the audience to the rare humpback whales, was screened in the preview, as well as the documentary essay Who We Were by the renowned German filmmaker Marc Bauder. The program also included the successful Czech film Planeta Praha by Jan Hošek and the Slovenian natural history documentary **One for the River: The Sava Story** by Rožle Bregar, which tells about this vital artery of the Balkans with a strong aesthetic sense.

The selection of films nominated for the Audience Award, awarded by the European Parliament in cooperation with the European Film Academy, included the LUX Audience Award section, which included the previously mentioned film Close, as well as the highly successful Swedish satire **Triangle** of Sadness directed by Ruben Östlund, a Portuguese-French queer musical set in 2069 Will-o'-the-Wisp by João Pedro Rodrigues. The Spanish-Italian film **Alcarràs**, directed by Carla Simón, offered the story of a family in the Spanish countryside which tries to save its orchard and its traditional life. I will look into the corrupt environment in a small Turkish town with Emin Alper's film **Burning Days**. . "Films and their creators have always sustained us through hard times. They bring us joy, reflection, inspiration and point out current problems. I am happy that I can also invite the audience to vote on the LUX Award competition films this year. The expert jury moved five films to the final, where we could vote to decide which one would win this unique European award. Thanks to the support of the European Parliament, the films could be subtitled in all the languages of the European Union and screened at several festivals. From previous years, I took away precious experiences, lessons, and the conviction that European film still has something to offer and is worth supporting. Have a great time!" invites the audience Michaela Śojdrová, vicepresident of the Committee for Culture and Education of the European Parliament.

Viewers could vote for the winning film until June 12 at <u>luxaward.eu</u>, and admission to screenings were free.

The MEDIA - Tribute to Fatih Akin section brought one new and several older films by a German director with Turkish roots. The 49-year-old winner of the Golden Bear from the Berlinale, the European Film Award and the Silver Lion from the Venice Film Festival won the hearts of the audience with his spontaneous narrative and portraits of torn heroes in films such as In the Fade, The Edge of Heaven, The Golden Glove or Soul Kitchen. DEF will also present Akin's new film **Rhinegold**.

Among current Czech film productions, DEF also included Adam Sedlák's successful films BANGER. and Michal Blašek's The Victim.

The festival program traditionally also thinks about the **minor spectators**. He offered an adaptation of Maurice Genevoix's popular book A Cat's Life, directed by Guillaume Maidatchevsky or an animated adventure film about a pair of squirrels, Hazelnuts, directed by Damien Maugin. Older children appreciated the adventure film **Mission Ulja Funk**, in which the enthusiastic astronomer Ulja discovers that an asteroid is about to hit Eastern Europe.

















































This year, the festival also invites under the giant domes of the **Observatory** in Brno and the Ostrava Planetarium, where specific films were shown in a full dome format. In addition to the animated Hazelnuts, viewers can visit the movie -22.7°C, by the French music producer Molécule which offers an audiovisual journey to frozen Greenland. The possibilities of the unique full dome projection were also used by the film Moonbase - The Next Step, directed by Graham Watts, which documents plans for creating a permanent base on the moon.

The main award for BEST FILM DEBUT won the directorial tandem of Lisa Akoka and Romane Gueret for the film **The Worst Ones**. The BEST MUSIC FILM award went to director Einari Paakkanen for the film Karaoke Paradise. This year, the jurors decided to also award the Special Jury Recognition, which director Damian Kocur received for the film Bread and Salt.

The award for the creator was accepted by the cultural attaché of France, Sarah Doignon.

The film **Bread and Salt** by the Polish director Damian Kocur was awarded **Special Jury Recognition**. The award was received by the deputy director of the Polish Institute, Wojciech Bednarek. "Bread and Salt is among the most formally mastered and, in the broadest sense, the most mature debuts of recent times. Above all, we appreciated Damian Kocuro's subtle yet extremely urgent directorial style and his extraordinary feeling for the everyday interactions of the characters and the traumas hidden beneath them. Authenticity combined with precise visual stylization gave birth to one of the most evocative European films about contemporary racism, the toxic legacy of the past and bullying, which at the same time dispenses with judgments and moralizing," explains one of the judges, Aleš Stuchlý.





Earth Day

After the film Nation of Whales screening, a talk by the world-famous filmmaker Steve Lichtag. The talk was about his fascination with the underwater world and whales and his earlier famous filming of a great white shark without a cage. The interview was broadcasted live to the Světozor cinema and online. (Brno, April 22)

After the screening of the film **Who We Were**, Ľuboš Slovák came to the Brno observatory for a discussion. Ľuboš deals with the relationship between man and non-human nature in various ways. 



































































































































Feedback in the media for DEF is collected by the partner company NEWTON Media and published on the festival website www.dnyevropskehofilmu.cz and offered for inspection to all organizing embassies and cultural institutes, main co-organizers and other partner institutions.

About 150 articles, reviews and interviews were published about the festival. As part of the online media campaign, DEF collected 1,554,826 impressions. The 30.DEF website had 9,507 unique visits and 26,511 page visits during the festival. Facebook recorded a reach of 130,144 accounts, and Instagram a reach of 53,960 accounts reached.
