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The 30th anniversary annual edition of the Days of European Film (DEF) Festival will take place in Prague, Brno and Ostrava from 20 to 25 April and in other cities and towns across the Czech Republic from 26 to 30 April. The genre-rich event, which will be opened by the Czech premiere of the Italian-French film L'immensità starring Penélope Cruz in the lead role, will bring more than forty films, ranging from distinctive debuts to the works of famous directors. "We will offer high-quality live action films as well as documentaries from nearly thirty countries, a crosssection of the works of famous German director Fatih Akin, films that received awards at major festivals as well as Oscar-nominated films, such as the Belgian film Close, the Irish drama The Quiet Girl or the delicate film Aftersun," says Šimon Šafránek, the festival's programming director.

Last year, the DEF festival transformed into a competition festival. Once again, the main competition will be focused on debuts, but the festival will also offer a competition section with musical films.

DEF has a new feature called Focus, which means there is a focus on the cross-border area of Benelux. "We highlight Benelux as the centre of coproductions and a proof that even small countries can play a prominent role in the film industry," Šimon Šafránek explains the focus of this year's annual edition of the festival whose programme will include, for example, the explosive drama Rebel by Adil El Arbi and Bilall Fallah, progressive Belgian creators with Moroccan background. Audience will also be able to watch the film Zillion about the origins of an eccentric disco club in the heart of Antwerp, based on true events. This film by Robin Pront was a hit in Belgium and the Czech audience will be able to see for themselves that the "nineties" were wild not only in our country.

All foreign language films are to be screened with Czech and, in most cases, English subtitles. The audience can also look forward to a rich accompanying programme or to meetings with filmmakers. The complete programme and tickets are available at eurofilmfest.cz.

"The universal theme of the current European cinema is young people, be it coming of age, relationships with parents or the search for one's own identity. It is as if filmmakers saw the only hope in the upcoming generation," says Šimon Šafránek, the festival's programming director. The main competition, which focuses on debuts, will feature several films, in which new child or young actors gave excellent performances and which include a Portuguese film titled *Alma Viva* or a Latvian drama titled *Sisters*. "The irony is that the debut section of the programme also includes a fantastic parkour drama Off the Rails by Peter Day, an established English television producer, which is regarded as the new Trainspotting," remarks Šimon Šafránek.

The competition of musical films will feature a varied mix of films based on true events and dynamic documentaries. It will also introduce a new film titled Rhinegold by Fatih Akin, a winner of the Golden Bear award at Berlinale, which shows the turbulent life of the rapper Xatar, or a film titled *Meet Me In The Bathroom* by the established pair Will Lovelace and Dylan











































The overwhelming majority of films will have their Czech premieres in the DEF programme, including the ones, which received awards at major world-class festivals. On 20 April, the festival will be opened by the Italian-French film *L'immensità*, which takes place in Rome in the mid-1970s. World-famous Penélope Cruz plays a woman whose marriage is crumbling and is only maintained for the sake of children. The oldest daughter Adriana, who feels as a boy and tries to convince all the people around her of this, is carefully observing the tension between parents. This unrestrained film about the complexity of coming of age was directed by Emanuele Crialese. The film *The Worst Ones* by directors Lise Akoka and Romane Gueret, who won the Un Certain Regard section with it, was highly acclaimed in Cannes. The best director award at the same festival was won by Alexandru Belc for his Romanian retro film *Metronome*. In the Orizzonti section of the festival in Venice, Italy, the best director award was won by Tizza Covi and Rainer Frimmel for their melancholy portrait *Vera*. The Polish film *Bread and Salt* by director Damian Kocur won the Special Jury Prize in Venice. The Swiss drama *Thunder* by director Carmen Jaquier and the avant-garde film *Piaffe* by visual artist Ann Oren featuring the excellent Simone Bucio in the role of a film sound engineer, who starts to develop a horse tail as a result of working on a commercial with a horse, were also presented at international festivals. Another film that will have its Czech premiere will be the comedy *Fathers* and Mothers by renowned Danish director and actress Paprika Steen, in

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The festival will also screen Oscar-nominated films. The drama The Quiet *Girl* by director Colm Bairéad takes place in the Irish countryside in 1981 where a timorous nine-year-old girl named Cáit is growing up with her problematic parents. Another Oscar-nominated film is the subtle story by Belgian director Lukas Dhont titled *Close*, which tells about two inseparable friends who, after spending carefree summer vacation together, find themselves at school where they are having difficulty integrating into the broader collective of boys. The melancholy drama Aftersun was also nominated for an Oscar and tells the story of a divorced young father and his adolescent daughter on vacation in a seaside resort in Turkey. This sensitive film by Scottish director Charlotte Wells will close the festival.

The Stars section will offer a selection of current film hits from worldrenowned filmmakers and actors. Among others, in the film *More Than Ever* by director Emily Atef, the audience will be reminded of the art of the tragically deceased French actor Gaspard Ulliel (Paris, je t'aime; Juste la fin du monde). In Vera by the director duo of Tizza Covi and Rainer Frimmel, Vera Gemma plays herself as a daughter of handsome Italian actor Giuliano Gemma who rose to fame in spaghetti westerns. Another film in this section is the biographical movie *Hilma* about Hilma af Klint, a Swedish pioneer of abstract art who lived at the turn of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. Director Lasse Hallström (What's Eating Gilbert Grape; The Cider House Rules) cast both his wife Lena Olin and his daughter Tora Hallström in this new film.

Among the successful debutant directors who may receive the main award of the festival, we can find Lise Akoka and Romane Gueret (*The Worst Ones*), Peter Day (Off the Rails), Colm Bairéad (The Quiet Girl), Damian Kocur (Bread and Salt), Ann Oren (Piaffe), Carmen Jaquier (Thunder) and Alexandru Belc (Metronome) as well as other very promising artists. DEF will also offer a sensitive film titled *Sisters* by Linda Olte, which tells the story of two sisters from a Latvian orphanage whom a family from the United States wants to adopt. The film *Alma Viva* by Portuguese director Cristèle Alves Meira, which offers a different view of the world through the eyes of children and adults, is also noteworthy.

Several films deal with the issue of coping with the collapse of the Soviet Union and topical themes such as fight for freedom and the need to face all kinds of disinformation. This is reflected in the Estonian film *Kalev* by director Ove Musting, which follows participation of the Estonian national basketball team in a Soviet prestigious tournament in 1990, as well as in the drama *January* by Latvian director Viesturs Kairišs, which takes place in the early 1990s when Latvia started its journey towards independence. The stylised sci-fi Phi 1.618 by Bulgarian director Theodor Ushev will offer a glimpse into the future when mankind approaches perfection. On the contrary, **Blockade** by Ádám Tösér will take the audience back to the year 1990 when Hungarian taxi drivers are preparing a blockade of their homeland to protest against the rising prices of gasoline. A media frenzy surrounding a presumed suspect of a brutal murder is the theme of another film, which is titled *The Judgement* and was directed by Dutch director Sander Burger. The Ukrainian cinema also has its place in this section. Butterfly Vision by Maksym Nakonechnyi tells the story of a female soldier who returned from captivity, in which she was held in Donbas as a prisoner of war for several months. "There are several hot topics in Europe and the world at present, which are also reflected in cinema and call for deeper thought and critical reflection. These indisputably include the war conflict in Ukraine, which was started by Russia, and the spreading threat of disinformation. This inspired us when we chose the films for the "To the Point" festival section, which is under the auspices of European Commission Representation. The films in our selection directly show the actual origins of disinformation as well as the fight against dictatorships, which are built on the active spreading of lies," adds Monika Ladmanová, the Head of European Commission Representation in the Czech Republic.

For a long time, the festival has also given opportunities to films dealing with wildlife issues. This year, in a preview, we will screen the wildlife documentary Whale Nation, in which Jean-Albert Lièvre takes the audience to rare humpback whales, as well as the documentary essay Who We Were by renowned German filmmaker Marc Bauder. The programme also includes the successful Czech film **Wild Prague** by Jan Hošek and the Slovenian wildlife documentary *One for the River: The Sava Story* by Rožle Bregar, which tells about this Balkans' artery of life with a distinctive aesthetic feeling.

DEF has a new feature called Focus, which means there is a focus on the crossborder area of Benelux. The selection of films nominated for the Audience Award presented by the European Parliament in cooperation with the European Film Academy will be in the LUX Audience Award section, which will offer the already mentioned film *Close* as well as the very successful Swedish satire *Triangle* of Sadness by director Ruben Östlund, the Portuguese-French queer musical set in the year 2069 titled *Will-o'-the-Wisp* by João Pedro Rodrigues. The Spanish-Italian film **Alcarràs** by Carla Simón will offer the story of a family in the Spanish countryside who is trying to save not only their orchard but also their traditional way of life. With **Burning Days** by Emin Alper, we will take a look at the corrupt environment in a small Turkish town. "Films and their creators have always supported us in hard times. They bring us joy, reflection, inspiration and point out current problems. I am happy to be able to invite audience members to vote on the competition films nominated for the LUX Award again this year. The expert jury chose five films for the finals, on which we can vote and decide which one of them will receive this unique European award. You can all vote until 12 June. Thanks to the support from the European Parliament, the films could be subtitled in all the languages of the European Union and screened at several festivals. At the previous annual editions of the festival, I gained really valuable experience, learned valuable lessons and became confident that European film still has a lot to offer and that it is worthwhile to support it. I wish you great entertainment!" said Michaela Šojdrová, the vice-chairwoman of the European Parliament's Committee on Culture and Education, to invite the audience. Audience members can vote on the winning film at luxaward.eu/cs/ until 12 June. Admission to screenings is free of charge.

The MEDIA - Tribute to Fatih Akin section will offer one new film and several older films by this German director with Turkish background. The 49year-old winner of the Golden Bear award at Berlinale, the European Film Award and the Silver Lion award at the festival in Venice has won the audience's hearts with his spontaneous story-telling and portraits of heroes with inner struggles in such films as *In the Fade, The Edge of Heaven, The* Golden Glove or Soul Kitchen. DEF will also present the Akin's new film Rhinegold.

From the contemporary Czech film production, DEF also included the successful films **BANGER**. by Adam Sedlák and **The Victim** by Michal Blaško in the programme.

Traditionally, the festival's programme also thinks of the **youngest audience** members. It will offer A Cat's Life, an adaptation of the popular book by Maurice Genevoix, directed by Guillaume Maidatchevsky, or the animated adventure film about two squirrels titled *Hazelnuts* by director Damien Maugin. Older children will certainly appreciate the adventure film *Mission Ulja Funk*, in which enthusiastic astronomer Ulja finds out that an asteroid is supposed to hit Eastern Europe.

This year, the festival also invites the audience to come under the gigantic domes of the Observatory in Brno and the Planetarium in Ostrava where specific films will be screened in fulldome format. In addition to the animated film *Hazelnuts*, the audience will be able to watch the film titled -22.7 °C, which was created by French director and music producer Molécule and















































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

### **DEF Awards**



# Film-related Accompanying Events Earth Day

After the screening of *Whale Nation*, there will be a debate with world-famous filmmaker Steve Lichtag. The topics of discussion will include fascination with the undersea world and whales as well as his previous famous filming work with a white shark without a cage. The debate will be broadcast live to the Světozor cinema and online. (Brno, 22 April)

After the screening of *Who We Were*, Ľuboš Slovák will come to the Observatory in Brno for a debate. Ľuboš extensively studies the relationships between human beings and non-human nature. At the department of environmental studies of the Faculty of Social Studies of the Masaryk University, he philosophically examines the changes of the concepts of nature and, inspired by deep ecology, develops refreshing learning methods. The debate will be broadcast live to the Světozor cinema and online. (Brno, 22 April)

**Disinformation: Eastern Europe** – The European Commission Representation in the Czech Republic and the Embassy of Latvia prepared a large debate, which will be held after the screening of *January* and which will deal with the topics of disinformation, encroachment on the rights of sovereign states and hybrid threats. The debate will be attended by Monika Ladmanová, the Head of European Commission Representation in the Czech Republic; Ondřej Soukup, an editor at *Hospodářské noviny*; Luboš Švec, a historian from the Institute of International Studies at the Faculty of Social Sciences of the Charles University; and Oldřich Bruža, a cybersecurity expert. The debate will be moderated by Mr. Michael Rozsypal. (Prague, 23 April)

**People and New Conditions for Life** – A debate after the screening of *Alcarràs*. Due to human influence, our planet is unstoppably changing. We are destroying our own environment and causing far-reaching problems. What impact do these changes have on our psyche, how is protection of nature connected with the global economy and for what changes should be get ready in the near future? Danuše Nerudová and natural scientist Petr Holík, the guests attending the debate, will help us find the answers to these and other questions. Moderated by Jakub Vácha. (Brno, 24 April)

**In the Same Boat** – The film hit *Triangle of Sadness*, popular with the audience, will be followed by a large debate about the topics based on the film: about social roles, about power, about the state of and changes in the Czech and European societies. The debate will be attended by philosopher

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**Queer Europe** – Between the screenings of *Will-o'-the-Wisp* and *Close*, a queer-themed debate will be held about the life of the LGBT community in the Czech Republic and the European Union as well as about the representation of minorities in politics and about the situation in the Czech society as regards its attitudes to minorities. The debate will be attended by Mrs. Pavlína Springerová, the Lord Mayor of Hradec Králové, and influencer Lenka Králová and will be moderated by Ondřej Holub. (Hradec Králové, 28 April)

**Animation Workshop for Children** – After the screening of *A Cat's Life*, a pixilation animation workshop will be ready for the little audience members in the Přítomnost cinema in Prague. Children will be given an opportunity to try out this animation technique and animate their drawn animals. We photograph each motion and when the film starts to play, the animal will come to life in a completely different way than in reality. And yet pixilation is a very quick and simple animation technique. (Prague, 23 April)

**Picture Slides** – The story of travelling along and discovering the river of Sava, which flows through Slovenia, Croatia and enters Danube in Belgrade, will be accompanied by a travel lecture from the Picture Slides series.
